The class room was the large open space be-tween the stalls, which stretched away for several hundred yards in the term of a street. The whole class was present and each member tried his best to land one of the prizes offered by the Fair Commission

The judging commenced at \$ c'clock on Monday of last week, and the embryo farmers scratched their heads vigorously in their endeavors to get each cow in her right place before he turned the paper over to Prof. Fowler, The judging took place all morning, and when 12:30 o'clock came a tired bunch of Aggles sized up the last class and went to dinner.
